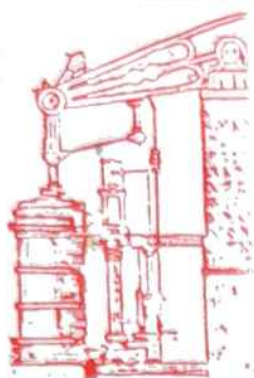

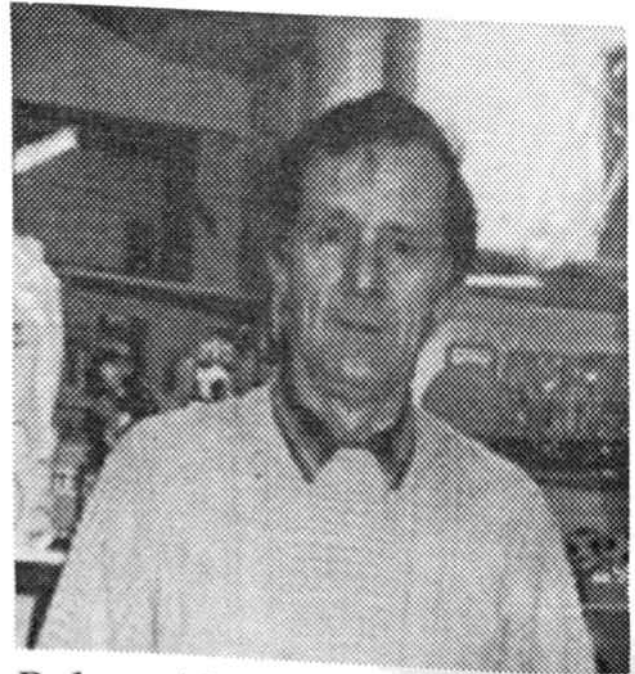

BOB BUTLER



Bob and his wife Mary moved to Hayle 12 years ago from the West Midlands. He is fifty-four, they have been married for thirty-four years, and have four grown up children.

He was made redundant after 27 years at the Jaguar Works in Coventry where he worked his way up from teaboy to Senior Production Foreman. A strong Union man, he was a Senior Con-



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vener and on the National Executive. But he felt it was time for a change. He and Mary decided to move to Cornwall and now run the Pet Shop in Pratts Market, Foundry.

Although not born and bred in Hayle, he regards himself as a local man. His children live here and his grandchildren were born in Cornwall.

Bob became a Town Councillor six years ago and, unlike the majority, he was elected and sees his role as being an important one. When asked why he had become a member of the Council, he replied that he had always attended meetings and had taken an interest in matters concerning the town. When someone suggested standing for election, he jumped at the chance.

He feels that because he is a local trader he is very much in the public eye and because of his training he is able to deal effectively with complaints and queries.

He feels that he has achieved quite a lot by being on the Town Council, none of it particularly outstanding, but he has managed to sort out a constant flow of various problems and this gives him a good feeling.

Bob feels strongly that the Council should have a higher profile within the town and everyone should be aware of who their councillors are and where they can be contacted. People should be more appreciative of the work done on their behalf and should be encouraged to attend the Public Participation Meetings, or just go along and listen in. These meetings are held once a fortnight,

HAYLE DAY CARE CENTRE TRUST

When I met Mrs. Thomas, the manageress of the Hayle Day Care Centre, she gave me such a mass of information about the services that are available, it makes it very difficult to know where to start.

Hayle Day Care Centre opened in March 1983 and, at the present time, provides about 800 hot home cooked meals each month. A main course with a pudding and a cup of tea costs just £1-60. That is an achievement in itself and, (dare I say it) that's for starters!

It must be a blessing for an older person to know that a nice lunch is to hand if necessary, and of course there is company if wanted; a laugh and a chat. There is also

something else that should be remembered; all the time that is spent in the Hayle Day Care Centre, there is no need to have the heating on at home! Who knows, stay long enough and you could be in pocket.

The Philip Smith Annexe was opened in March 1993. This houses the latest and most up-to-date bathing facility that anyone could ask for. It also has the necessary equipment for Hairdressing and Hand Care.

Also in the Philip Smith Annexe, dancing (modern and old time) takes place on Tuesday and Friday afternoons, and alternative Saturday evenings. I must admit that I would be in dire trouble if I did not mention the dancing. It appears that everyone is welcome, and assured of having a great time.

Reg and Mary Parnell of Mellanear Road run the dances and stressed the fact that you don't have to be over 60 to come and join in - as far as they are concerned the more the merrier. There is a modest entrance fee, but it is well worth it just for the gentle exercise and the companionship. All funds raised are for the Hayle Day Care Centre.

A new minibus was acquired in 1994, equipped with a tail lift to assist the less



able. The hall is hired out, not only to make full use of the facilities, but to help raise funds. MacMillan day care is in attendance every Wednesday and Arthritic care is there once a month.

Shopping -for prescriptions, dentists, opticians and doctors can be arranged; further details of all these will be covered at a future date.

Hayle Day Care Centre depends a lot on volunteers. So if you have an hour or more to spare, your help would be greatly appreciated.

Call in or phone 75-5000. You will be welcomed with open arms. A donation would also be welcome. It is your centre, can you help?

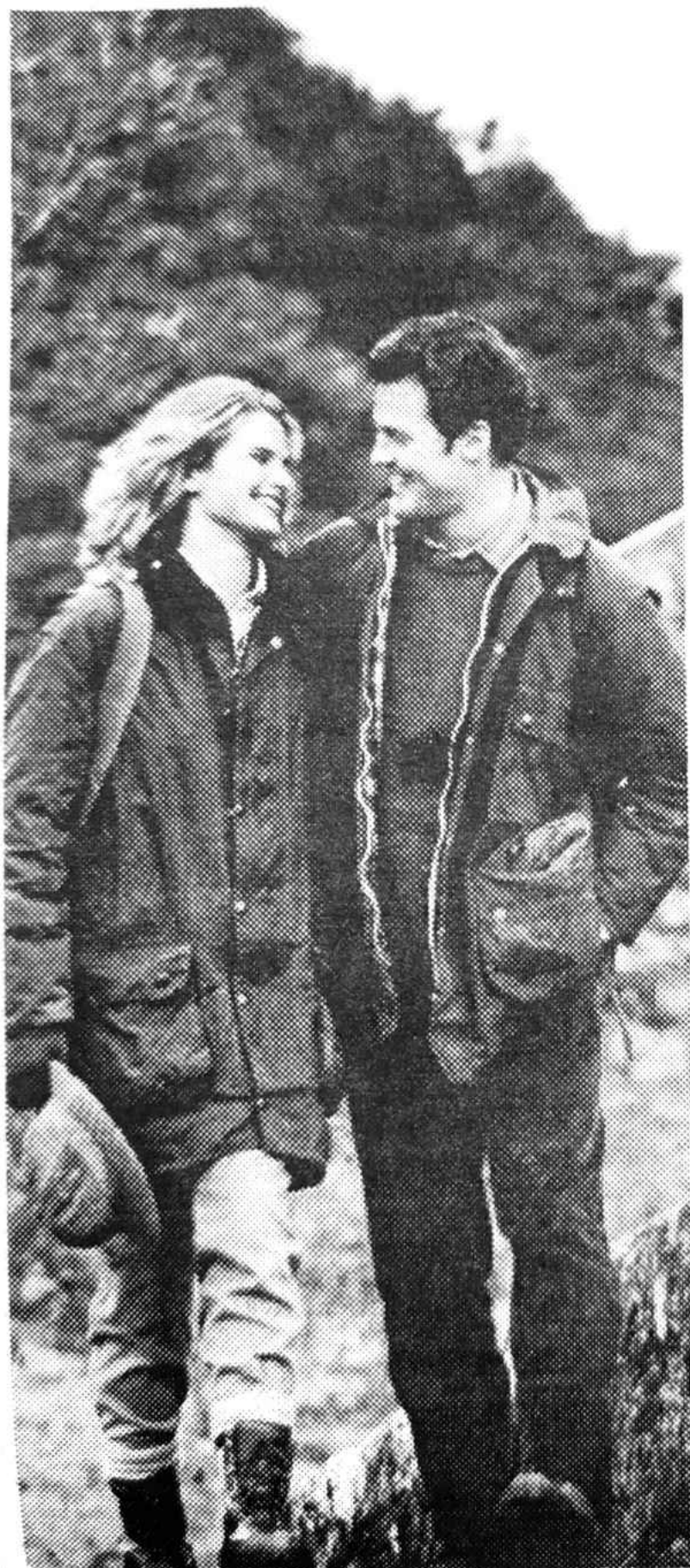

THE HAYLE PUMPS

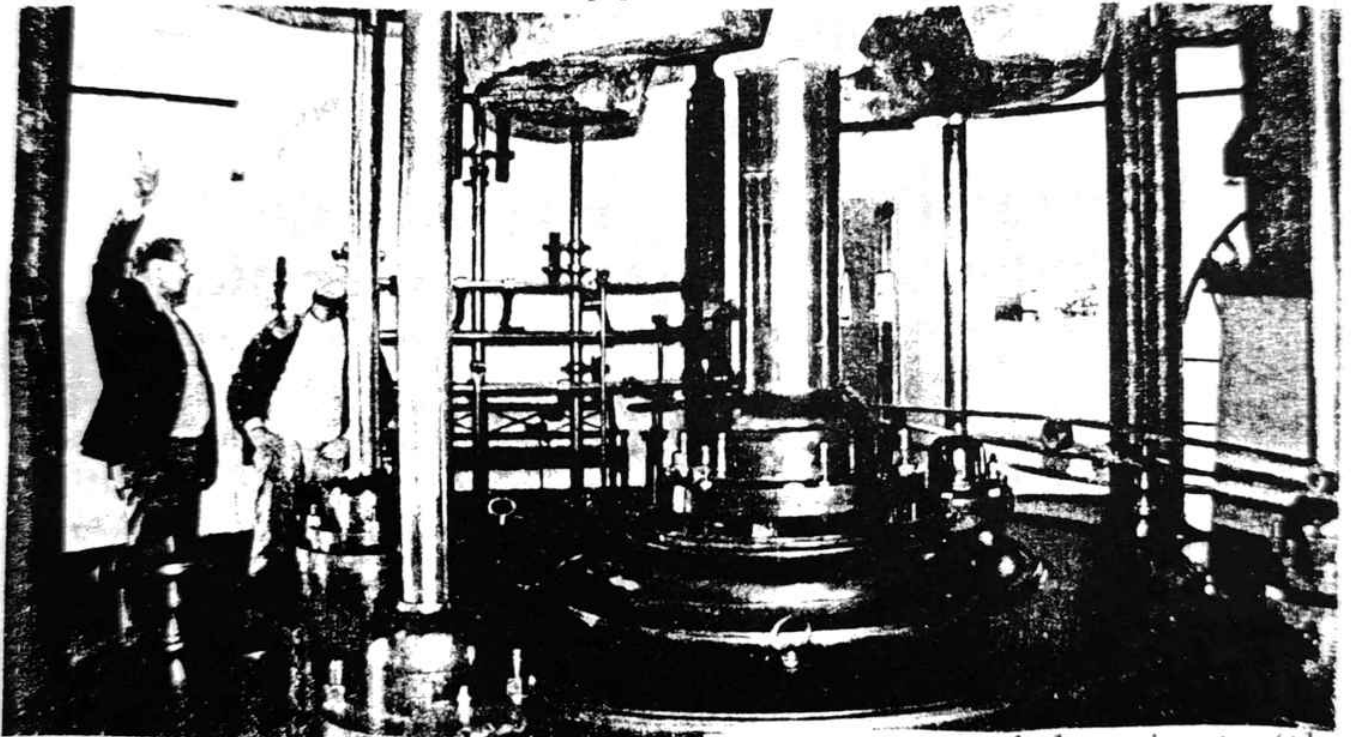

It is always surprising how many people in Hayle are not aware of the greatness of the town about 150 years ago.

Hayle was one of the greatest heavy metal industrial towns of that time. Some of the greatest engineers came from the area, while others recognised the opp-

There were three huge pumps destined to be built. All three, built by Harveys of Hayle, were to be the largest ever built in the world.

They were used to drain Haarlem Lake in Holland so that the land could be used for agricultural purposes. It was a tremendous undertaking, but the rewards for the Dutch would be about 70 square miles of new productive land.



ortunities and came to take part in the amazing industrial revolution that had been going on for the past century. There are many names that stand out and should be mentioned, but as far as pumps go, there was only one. The one that was chosen from far and wide and from across the sea to build important pumps. The name, of course, was Harveys.

The first of the giants (the main piston rods weighed nearly four tons) was started in 1843, but it was 1845 before the monster, giant, (call it what you will), began its mammoth task.

Work started on on the other two pumps in 1846. The first casting of one of them was a disaster. There was a blockage as the molten metal was being poured into the

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mould, so it had to be scrapped. These last two pumps were completed and commenced their task in 1848.

Three years later, these three magnificent engines had drained Haarlem Lake. They continued to keep the lake drained until the early 1930's. One of the pumps can still be seen on site, where it is one of Hollands important national monuments.

Other great pumps were made by Harveys. One of the most famous was supplied to the East London Waterworks. It could pump 9000 gallons of water per minute against a 140 foot head of water. It won the Great International Prize

Medal in 1862. This marvellous piece of Hayle engineering found its rightful place in the Science Museum in South Kensington, London.

When you stop to think and consider all the large industrial towns that the Dutch had to choose from, it says a great deal about the abilities, skill and dedication of the engineers and workforce of Hayle.

It is something we should all be proud of.

HAYLE TOWN COUNCIL

1.

The Council and the Penmare sponsored a Free Disco at the Penmare on Thursday 12 January.

180 Young people turned up and during the evening they were spoken to by a number of Councillors who found them very forthright and constructive in their views.

A Cinema and Skateboard Park featured high on their requirements and they felt they needed somewhere they could go just to meet their friends, a stop off point. Their ideas will be further debated and it is the intention of the Council to progress what they can, with assistance of other youth bodies and any agency that can assist.

2.

The Multi Purpose Hall for Hayle at Carew House has now received its Planning Permission and the Council will now rigorously pursue the Finances for this project.

£100,000 has been promised from Penwith District Council. The anticipated costs will be in the Region of £350,000 and the Council are looking for support from the Community to highlight the need for such a Multi Purpose Hall.

3.

Penwith Adult Education are the first tenants to move into Carew House and are now taking on students on a variety of courses. The Town Council welcomes them and wishes them great success with their venture. Other leases are now being discussed.

4.

At their meeting on 19th January the Council were addressed by Supt Sturland and Sgt Richards from the Devon and Cornwall Constabulary.

The Superintendent stated the future of Hayle Police

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Station was safe, at this time, although the Chief Constable had instigated a review on the siting of all his Police Stations and the results of this were not yet known. He dealt with staffing levels at Hayle and with general crime and vandalism matters.

The Council dealt with full Agendas on each of its meetings since the last edition of the 'Pump' and should anybody be interested to read the Minutes, they are available in the Library, once they have been approved by the Council.

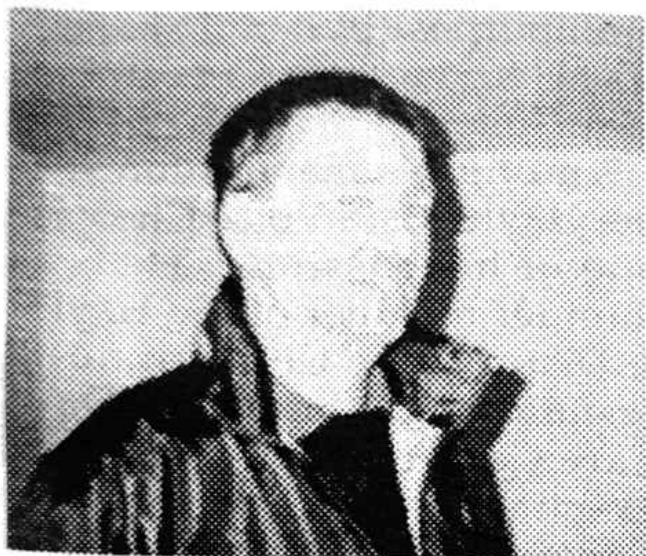

Meet your councillors
in alphabetic order:

BRIAN CAPPER

Brian Capper's youthful energy belies his 48 years, most of which he has spent here, having been born in Hayle. He is married with two children, now adults of 24 and 27, who still live at home.



It was some 16 years ago that he was encouraged by a friend (then on the council) to stand for election and so help lessen the inter-party politicking then going on. "I am not and never have been a member of any political party, my views are my own formed by consultation with as many people as possible, which I would like to think represent those of the people of Hayle"

He will be trying for a fifth term in the Council elections in May. On the effectiveness of Hayle Town Council, it is his view, which he shares with others, that they do not

get the support they deserve from Penwith District Council on the many important issues affecting the future of the town.

"We are keen to take on board more and dictate our own destiny. We should have more say in planning. Recently, however, this is changing and Penwith D.C. realise we have something important and worthwhile to say."

He went on to say that although they do agree on the majority of planning decisions, he is worried that the proposals for the future of the Hayle Harbour development will not be discussed with the town before being submitted for approval and so could be a 'fait accompli'.

Prior consultations could remove any objections and difficulties the project may encounter from the people of Hayle at a later date (when they eventually see the project plans).

His duties as councillor combined with his full-time employment at B.T. means that he finds there are not enough hours in the day. B.T. does try to accommodate his need to be absent from work to carry out Council business for which he is grateful. He does say that people are not

really aware of how much time is taken up reading notes, preparing for meetings and listening to people's problems if the job is to be done properly.

His advice to anyone who intends to stand for election to the Council is this: they should attend Council meetings and note the amount of time involved.

Another of the drawbacks of the job was being constantly drawn into talking about council business at parties or other social occasions!!

But, on the other hand, he is proud that he was privileged to be Mayor of Hayle in 1984 -

1986, during which time he was involved with the creation of the by-pass which resulted in much reduced traffic congestion in the town.

More recently, he is pleased to see the Carew House project (with which he has been closely involved) come into being and he is looking forward to the third phase, the multipurpose pyramid-shaped hall being started in May/June.

Among his many interests, the Hayle Male Voice Choir is one of his passions. He is a founder member of the Hayle & District Age Concern now re-named as the Hayle Day Care Centre Trust, and is an ex-chairman of the Hayle Carnival Committee, with which he is still involved. It gives him enormous pleasure to do this, bringing the people of Hayle an opportunity to participate in fund-raising for various charities and have some fun as well.

As to the future, he would like to see lots of job opportunities for the 600 or so unemployed persons created here by encouraging business, industry and tourism, with first class leisure facilities provided for everyone.

Hayle is fortunate in that the elderly are fairly well catered for, but now it is the

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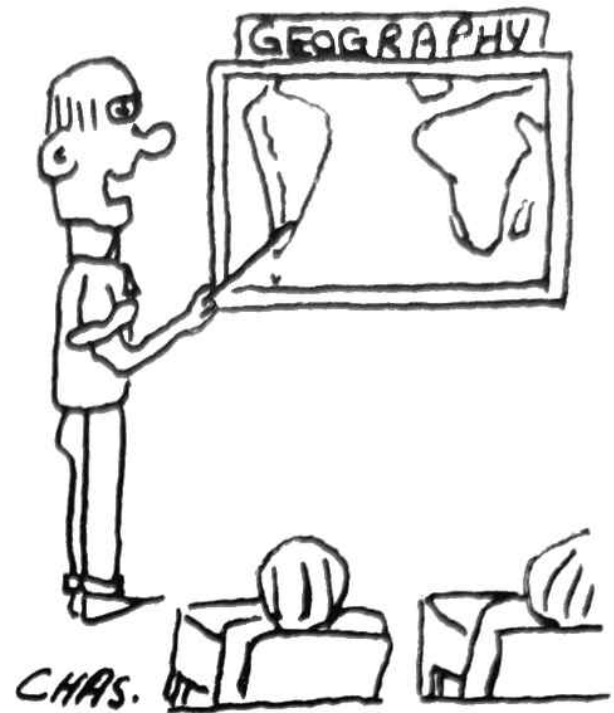
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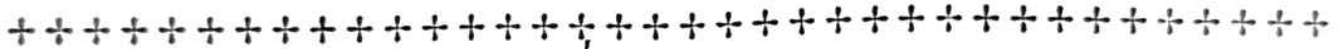

PENZANCE AND ST IVES 'CLEAN SWEEP' UPDATE

The first phase of South West Water's multi-million pound 'Clean Sweep' coastal sewage treatment scheme for Penzance and St Ives is well on target for completion in time for this year's bathing season.

A major element of the scheme is the virtual rebuilding of the company's waste water treatment works at Hayle which will treat the sewage flows which at present discharge through 47 crude outfalls into the sea in Mounts Bay or St Ives Bay.

Treatment includes preliminary, primary and secondary treatment before the treated waste water is discharged through a tunnelled outfall off Gwithian.

Construction work for the new buildings at Hayle is now practically complete, and commissioning is ongoing of some of the new elements. The new works is due to be treating all the flows from Penzance, Newlyn and Mousehole by the spring.

The full 2.6 Kilometre length of the Gwithian tunnel was reached in August this year. A 900mm diameter pipeline has been installed in the tunnel to carry the treated

waste water for discharge through four diffuser points.

Excavation of the 2.3 kilometre sewer tunnel running beneath the sea bed from Albert Pier to Wherrytown, Penzance, was completed last year, and has been lined with concrete. The tunnel forms part of the trunk sewer network pumping flows to Hayle for treatment. In storm conditions, the tunnel sewer has sufficient capacity to hold several million gallons of water before it is pumped to Hayle for treatment.

Phase two of the scheme, a pumping station at Porthgwidden, St Ives, and new trunk sewer which will link St Ives into the new waste water treatment works at Hayle, is well under way.

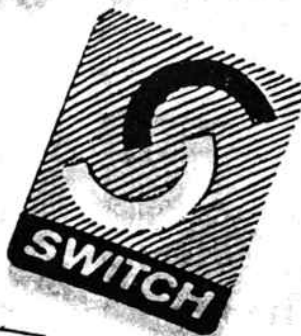
In addition to the network of new pipes, a programme of improvements to existing sewers is being carried out. The programme includes replacement or refurbishment, depending on condition. Where appropriate we are also laying new surface water sewers to keep rainwater separate. This helps release more capacity in the existing sewers for foul sewage.

KEEP ON PUMPIN'

Dear "Hayle Pumpers",
I was interested to read at the end of last month's featured interview a comment of hope relating to the future of Hayle.

I am writing in support of this and to give confidence to those of us fortunate to live in this town. I am one of those dreaded immigrants to Cornwall, having moved down to Hayle from London to work in August 1991. I was immediately struck by the potential of what is indeed a very historic town, albeit an industrial one.

On arrival I set about trying to find out as much as I could about Hayle and I was more than pleasantly surprised when I discovered what a significant role Hayle had

played in the roller-coaster of the Industrial Revolution in terms of trade, transport, mining, smelting, manufacturing and power generation. We are justifiably proud of this and perhaps now is the time to centralise the historical resources of the area and to develop a well co-ordinated museum, chronicling the development of Hayle.

I was struck from my early days in Hayle by the amazing physical potential of the town, having one of the most outstanding natural beaches in the country. What is so interesting about the beach, however, is the fact that as yet it is very undeveloped - part of the attraction you may say, but development doesn't have to spell "the end" for the beauty of the beach.

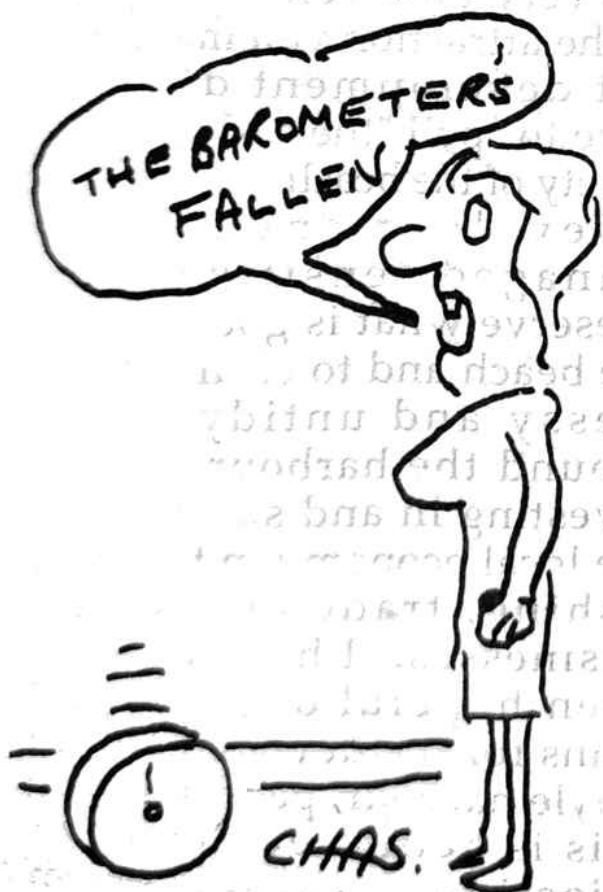
Development can be managed sensitively to preserve what is good about the beach and to clear up the messy and untidy areas around the harbour, whilst investing in and supporting the local economy in terms of fishing, trade and small businesses. I have always been hopeful of proposed plans for the development of Hayle harbour, particularly if this is achieved with an injection of capital from

outside the area, even outside the country. We need the large investment provided by these sources, which are far greater than any finance of grants available locally.

The future of Hayle is very bright, as we have our own natural resources to call upon. There is much evidence already of what can be done when people pull together, you only have to look at the successful environmental and community projects that have been achieved so far. The town has improved greatly in the last three years, lets hope the New Year sees a continuation of this trend.

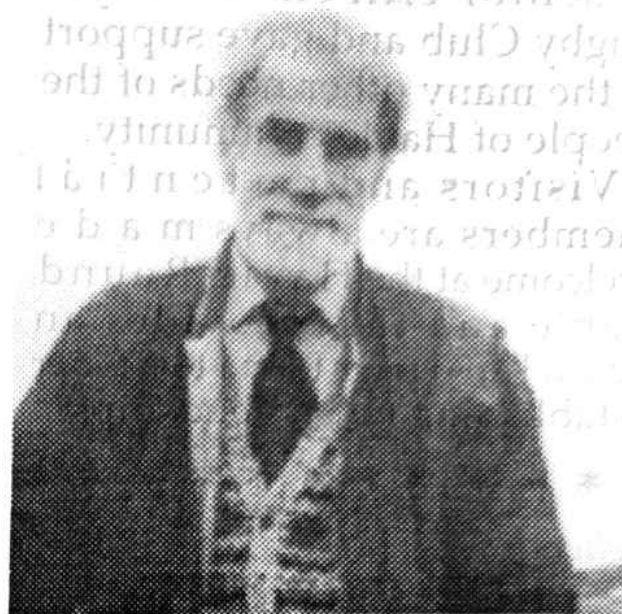

DAVID CAMBRIDGE



David Cambridge has a real desire to do his utmost for the people of Hayle. He fits in duties as a Town and District Councillor with his job as postman, and he admits it eats into his family life. He is married with two daughters, Emily and Charlotte, one of whom is at Falmouth College of Arts and the other in Germany studying art.

This is his fourth year as a town councillor and he is due to stand for re-election in May. Previously, he was in the Labour Party and was asked to stand, having made the commitment, he has done his best to fulfil it.

One of the problems at the moment is that not enough people come forward for

election to the Town Council, but that may change at the next election.

He said, "I am very pleased that the *Hayle Pump* has tried to get people involved, which is what we really need. It is difficult to get people to do things for themselves; you can give to them for evermore, but when it comes down to it, they have to have self-respect, and that comes from helping themselves".

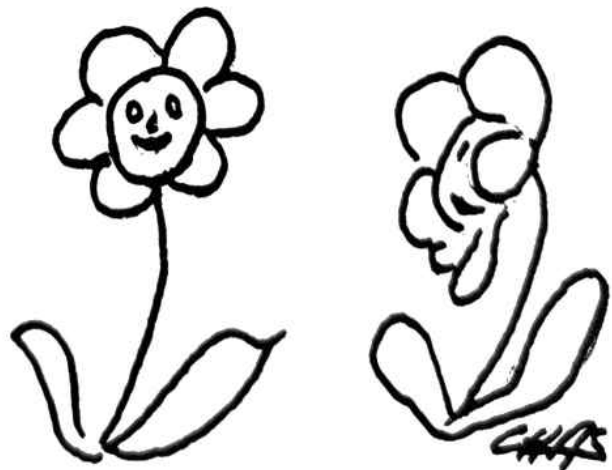
When asked about party loyalties, he said that as he was kicked out of the Labour Party, he doesn't have to vote on party lines; anyway, he had always voted with his conscience.

He gets enormous satisfaction from helping the people of Penwith and raising the profile of the arts. The drawbacks to being a councillor are: being in the public eye, being scrutinised and being criticised. It takes a lot of time and costs money.

He supported the Acorn Theatre in its bid for cash to enable it to stay open, and commented that the Acorn serves the whole of Penwith, not just Penzance. One spin-off from that support will be that the open air theatre (to be installed) at Millpond will also be used by various groups and troupes performing at the Acorn.

David is busy endeavouring to set up a Sculpture Park and Trail, here in Hayle, which may become part of the St Ives 1997 Festival of the Arts. This, he hopes, will encourage large numbers of visitors to Hayle, providing a window to the great potential we have here, just like the Tate has done for St Ives. He is Chairman and founder member of Penwith Arts Working Party.

On the future of Hayle, he thinks that priority should be given to economic regeneration and the creation of jobs. The town is earmarked for 1000 homes, to be built here and in the surrounding district, with no industry or jobs to go with them. There is an abundance of industrial land available and every effort should be made to encourage industry to come here. Tourism should not be seen as

the main industry, but as the icing on the cake of a strong economic base. He would like to see workshops set up providing high quality skills such as stone-cutting and sculpting, particularly to help the youth of Hayle.

Lastly, when asked, as a councillor, which issue brought the most satisfaction, he didn't hesitate to quote the part he played with others in exposing the proxy voting scandal, and the fact that he spoke out about the sleaze allegations levelled at the Tory side on Penwith Council, concerning leaked confidential memos to interested third parties.

COMMUNICATION INVOLVING EVERYONE AIDS UNDERSTANDING

Following a study by the Hayle & District Lions Club in 1993, responding to reports that homeless people were living in the Hayle area, it was discovered that people who were assumed homeless had been sleeping rough in the shelters in St. Georges Walk and at Hayle Railway Station.

Further investigation revealed a number of homeless people in Camborne, Penzance (mainly at the railway station) and at the Marazion beach area. Attempts to help were made by the Lions Club by providing blankets and warm clothing.

The Lions Club decided to broaden its brief and consider the problem of social needs within the Hayle area. It was found like many other town in the U.K. the problems identified were similar and could be considered in the following groups:-

- Lack of adequate shelter (accommodation)
- Organisational Problems
- Insufficient support for the Aged.
- Insufficient support for the youth.

Insufficient support for the disabled.
 Sickness
 Poverty
 Vices (drugs, alcohol etc.)
 Policing (Law and order)
 Unemployment
 Wandering People
 Mentally ill (care in the community)
 Travellers
 Those seeking work
 And lastly, ineffective communication at all levels.

Following two public meetings, it was decided to form a committee called:

HAYLE AND DISTRICT
 COMMUNITY LIAISON
 COMMITTEE

based on the following terms of reference:

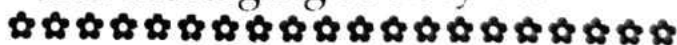
To assist with the communication process and to support all existing agencies. In an attempt to make more efficient use of existing person power and resources. Also as an Independent Body to encourage citizens to become more active in appreciating and attempting to solve obvious problems within the Community.

It was agreed that the majority of problems identified were interrelated, the possible causes of many of the problems seemed to be due to inadequate resources,

unemployment, ineffective organisation and planning, duplication of effort and lack of communication.

It appeared that unless we are prepared to help ourselves there seemed little evidence to suggest that things are going to improve. It was then considered that if the Hayle & District Community Liaison Committee was to be truly democratic and meaningful we needed to involve everyone, so as to be able to accurately represent peoples opinions and needs. Therefore all sections of society must be represented:-

- Those in work.
- The unemployed.
- Those responsible for education.
- The young, The elderly, The disabled, The disadvantaged,
- Those responsible for administrating our welfare and managing society etc.

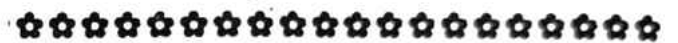
"Not at all," smiled the lady. So the man picked up the dog and threw it over the wall.

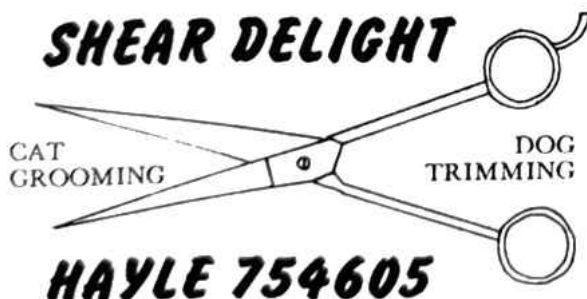

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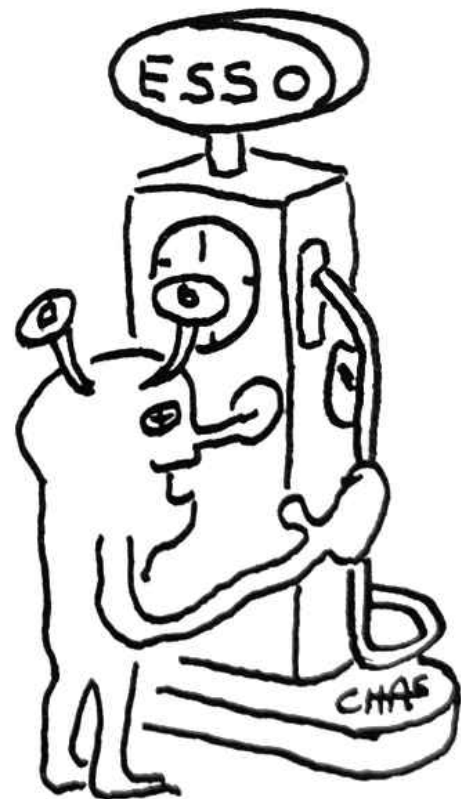

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HAYLE ADULT OPEN LEARNING CENTRE

Hayle Adult Open Learning Centre is now Open! The centre is at Carew House, the new community development next to the Bodriggy Health Centre.

We offer support for adults in reading, writing and maths skills all day on Tuesdays and on Thursday and Friday mornings.

Courses in word processing and information technology take place at various times including Wednesday afternoons and Thursday evenings.

We hope to offer other subjects if there is enough demand, so let us know if there is something you would particularly like to study - if there is enough interest we may be able to get a course going. The centre is geared especially to the needs of adult students and learning is informal in a relaxed and friendly environment.

Open learning aims to be flexible and easily accessible for people who may find it difficult to attend a "regular" course because of work or family commitments.

Students do not attend a "set" course but book and attend tutor sessions as and

when they can. In addition to sessions with the tutor they can "drop in" to the centre and use the resources to practise skills and develop their learning.

With this method, students can work at their own pace, with help and encouragement from staff if needed. This approach has proved very popular with the first students enrolled on the introductory computer literacy course on Wednesday afternoons and Thursday evenings.

For people who have no experience at all with computers, information technology can seem bewildering. However, the students, many of whom have never used a computer before, leave the centre brimming with enthusiasm for the course.
