LIGHTING FOR HAYLE CAUSEWAY.

The recent fatal accident, in November of last year, at the junction of Hayle Causeway near the Old Quay House Inn

has prompted many stories of how dangerous it is to walk or cycle along the Causeway, particularly at night.

While there **is** a footpath on one side of the road or the other for it's whole length, there is **no** lighting. A particularly dangerous area is that junction by the Old Quay House, where the lighting for the St. Erth roundabout finishes and you are plunged into darkness right where the road from Lelant joins the Causeway.

Cornwall County Council's Transportation Department, the body responsible for lighting have no plans to install any on the Causeway, and due to funding restrictions, limits proposals for new lighting to those which are either:- part of a safety scheme--which might include areas where night-time accidents are a problem, or places with a high number of pedestrians after dark, or -- Road Improvement Schemes.

So if **you** have any views about whether lighting would make the Causeway safer, please write in c/o The Pump Office,(they need not be printed if you wish), so that your opinions can be passed on to the County Council.

Hayle Rose & Cabbage Horticultural Society

*Meeting on Thursday 15th Feb.
at Phillack Church Hall*

The subject of this month's meeting was Chrysanthemums and was given by Mr. Alister Rivers from Probus Gardens. He gave a brief outline of the present work and courses available at Probus Gardens which have been curtailed somewhat over the past years on account of the cutbacks in Government public expenditure. Despite this they were still able to spread knowledge and create interest

in horticulture throughout the county.

With the propagation of chrysanthemums, a good rooting compost was essential i.e., the ability to drain water well and yet retain moisture. This was achieved with a mixture of 25% peat, 25% chipped bark and 50% coarse grit, and samples of these materials were passed around for the audience to inspect and cogitate at the meeting of the above criteria. The compost needed to be well watered and drained before inserting the cuttings. He then made some cuttings and passed them around for inspection before planting them in the pots of compost.

Many questions were asked. In his experience, he found that roots did not develop so well in a nutrient free compost. Rooting powder agents deteriorated rapidly and there was no point in using them. Immersion in fungicide before planting had the effect of slowing down the development of the roots. More plants could be obtained from shoot cuttings than stool bud cuttings.

Mr. Richard Addiscott thanked Mr. Rivers for a very

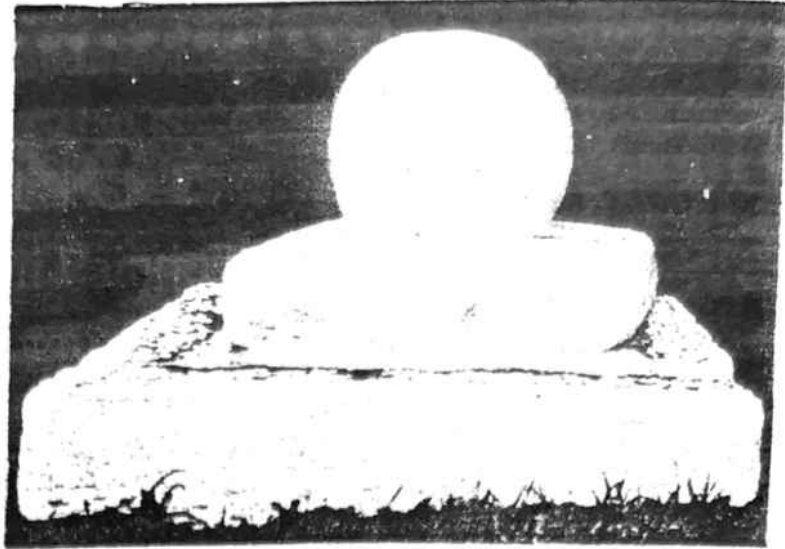

PROFILE ON COUNCILLOR GEORGINA SCHOFIELD

**"A FEW WELL-CHOSEN
WORDS"**

"It's your turn now!" they told me. "But how can I possibly follow on after Councillor Pollard?" I replied. "Give it your best shot!" they said. So this is

it, Folks!

I was born in Littlehampton, a seaside town in Sussex, but my family come from Yorkshire, via Ireland, with a little Russian blood thrown in for good measure. "Cross-bred, like Barney's Bull, my mother always said.



My working life began in farming, after completing a National Diploma in Agriculture at Plumpton College, but my career was interrupted by a serious motor-cycle crash in 1961. The next two years were spent undergoing treatment in hospital.

From 1964-73 I lived on Kibbutz Beit Ha Emek in Northern Israel, managing their Calf-Rearing Unit. I was also a co-curator of the Regional

Museum, sited on the Kibbutz, working with my late husband, Gille, a journalist-turned archaeologist, on many sites, until his death in 1972.

On returning to England I spent four years in Canterbury before joining my mother in Hayle in 1977. I came originally for a short stay, but I still can't tear myself away after nearly nineteen years.

I became a Town Councillor in 1987. Although I am a long-time member of the Labour Party. I do not believe in bringing politics into local

government, because so many issues that we deal with cross over the party divide. We achieve far more for the community by working together and sharing ideas, than by party dogma.

I suppose that most people know me as that "Crazy Lady" who works around the Millponds. I was a founder member of the Hayle Town Trust and the Millponds was our first major project. For the past nine years it does seem to have taken over my life, in the nicest possible way, of course, making

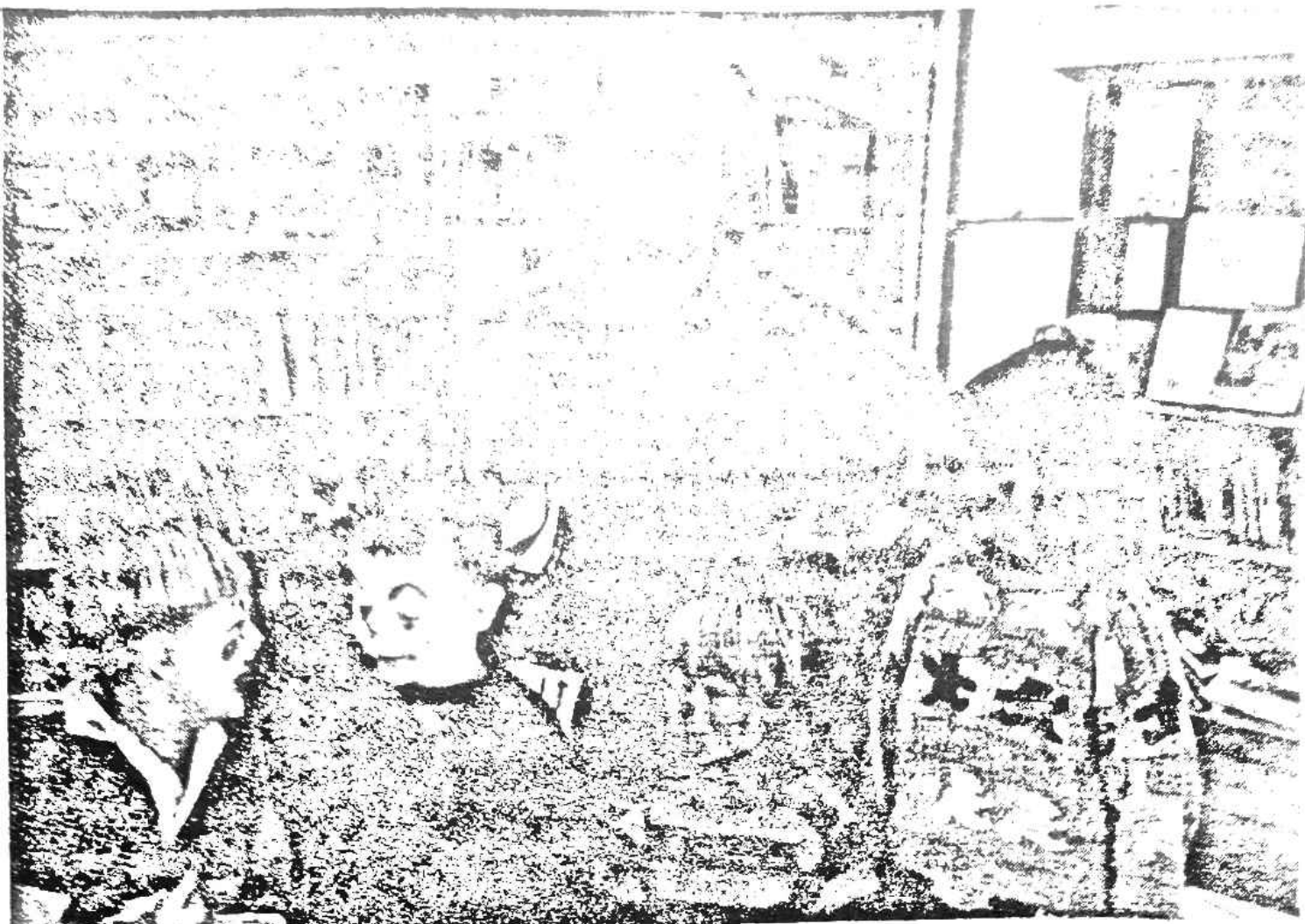

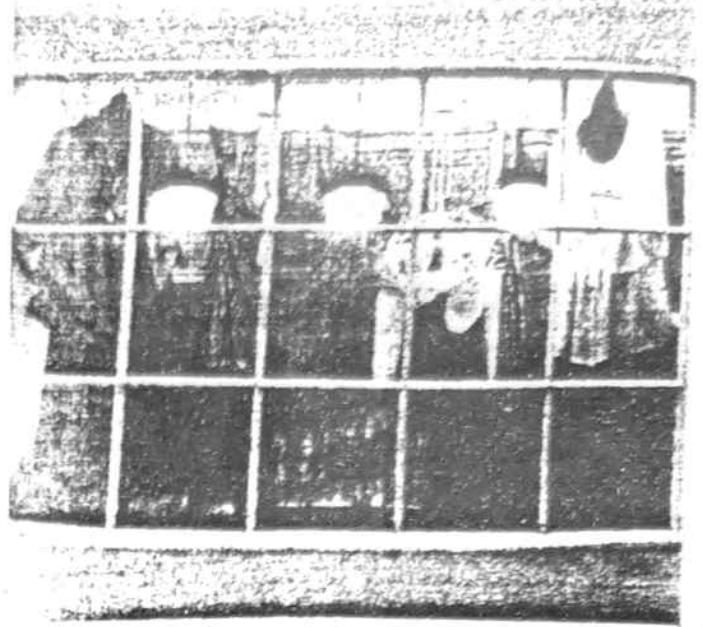

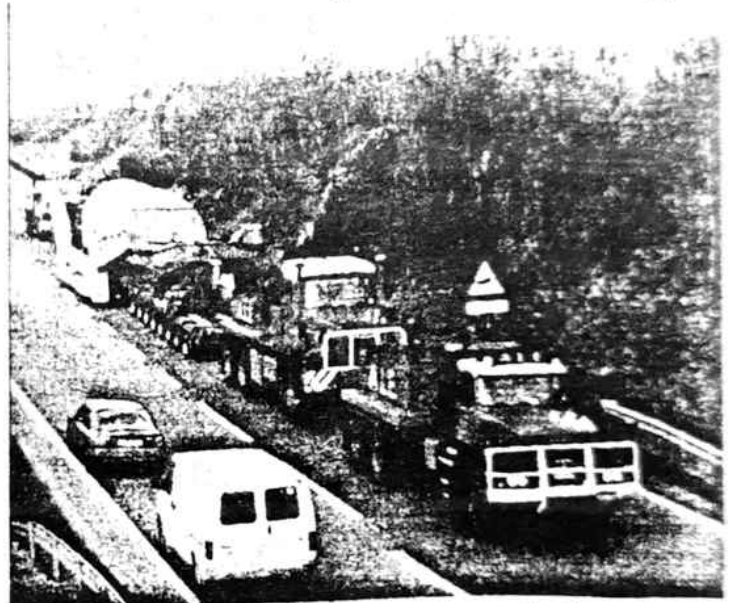
CONVOY CRAWLS THROUGH HAYLE

On Sunday March 24th the second of three giant loads was transported from Penzance for an oil-fired power station at Indian Queens. This turbine was slightly smaller than the first but weighed heavier, being over four hundred tons in weight. It took three massive Scammell tractor trucks to move it, a sight rarely seen in Cornwall, escorted by the Police, council and SWEB. Both turbines began their journey at New York's General Electrics Company, being shipped across the Atlantic to Southampton then to Penzance on a roll-on roll-off vessel. The job to transport the loads on the forty mile trip was undertaken by ALE Transport (Abnormal Load Engineering), based at Stafford.

The load was parked along the promenade in Penzance, which gave people a chance to view the huge trucks assigned for the task, at close range.

The procession left Penzance prom at 6.30 am, an obstruction and brake problems initially occurred, but it soon got going again. It

reached the Hayle by-pass at 9.45 am with spectators watching and snapping their cameras from the bridges. The vehicles could only move at eight miles an hour, so it took them a whole day to get to the destination. However, this trip suffered fewer problems and hold ups than the first one (on March 10th),



which needed a second day to complete.

Their will be one final chance to see these huge, powerful vehicles in May, when the transformer will take the same route.

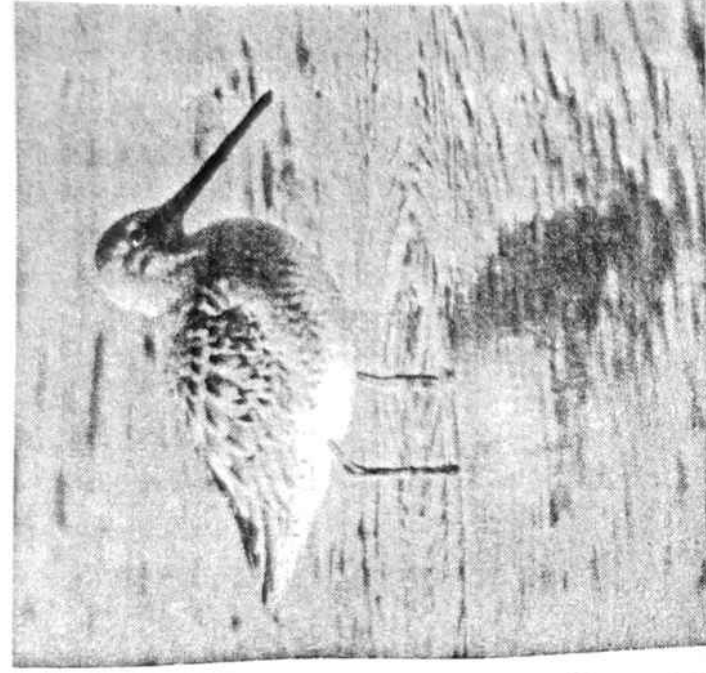

WATCH THE BIRDIES

As the winter draws to an end and springtime comes round again, it's time for our winter visitors to start moving out and the summer ones to move in, but before looking forward to those, here's what's been happening over the last few months. The high point has to be the visit of a very rare vagrant from North America which brought twitchers down to Hayle from all over the country. It was the Long-Billed Dowitcher (pictured), a wading bird which decided to stay in town, generally the



Black Bridge area of Copperhouse, for a number of weeks. If you managed to find it you should have had a good close look since the bird was very tame and seemed to enjoy all the attention it was creating. Further along Copperhouse Pool, around the library area, a solitary Pink-Footed Goose found a resting place amongst the flocks of gulls. In mentioning gulls, visiting birdwatchers to Hayle continue to show great interest in the Ring-Billed Gulls which have actually set up residence in the town for the last few years and staying the full length of them!

Now to the Carnsew and Estuary area, here Divers continue to dominate, a Black Throated was spotted with signs of it's breeding plumage.

This joins the Great Northern still present and from time to time a Red Throated pops in. A pair of Eider Ducks have been coming in with the tide, mainly between the Lelant and Carnsew channel, a pair of Scoter Ducks and also Shoveler Ducks have been seen. Red-Neck Grebe, Slavonian Grebe, Goosanders and Mergansers continue to be present.

On a number of visits to Carnsew Pool I met up with RSPCA Warden Rex Harper, who along with others, have released many birds there after being treated from the effects of oil, some, but not all

of which have come from the Millford Haven "Sea Empress" disaster. Among the birds released were three Mute Swans, Great Northern Diver, Scoter and Razorbill. It's thanks to the voluntary efforts of the RSPCA that these birds have had their lives saved.

The Millpond has another Muscovy Duck to add to the other four, this one is white and seems to prefer it's own company rather than theirs. The two young swans were still present at the time of writing, despite being chased and prodded by the two adults who are now eager to get rid

of their off-spring before hopefully rearing more this year. There is already one egg in the nest with more likely to follow.

So now we look forward to the joy of longer evenings to enjoy the sights of summer. Every year House Martins, Swallows and Swifts perform their wonderful aerial displays. The supreme of these being the Swift which eats, mates and even sleeps in the air! If a Swift lands on the ground it is unlikely to get back up. They nest in holes of cliffs and buildings, going straight in and out without pause or hesitation, so they are very hard to observe outside of flight. House Martins are usually first to arrive, closely followed by Swallows. Swifts are the last to arrive but the first to go back, usually gone by the end of August. Other birds likely to appear as summer approaches include Sandwich, Little, Common and possibly other types of Tern. Spoonbills sometimes visit in spring for a feeding stop on route to it's breeding ground.

It's the smaller birds that make the biggest impression through summer. Probably

the hardest family of birds to identify and see are Warblers. They spend their time under deep cover and many of them look so much alike. Try looking in the reeds between the Recreation Ground and Black Bridge area, here you may hear, if not see Sedge and Reed Warblers and also Reed Buntings. Dense tree, shrub and bushy areas like the Millpond wall and King George V Walk might be areas to spot Willow, Wood and Garden Warblers. If you're an expert on these birds you may identify others. On the Weir and Towans areas you may see the beautiful Whitethroat, another type of Warbler. Meanwhile on the ground other lovely birds like the Wheatear, Black Redstart and Stonechat may be seen, the latter also perches on wires and gorse bushes. These birds will be described more fully, if and when they are seen, in future reports.

Finally, don't forget to listen for the Cuckoo, it's more likely to be heard than seen so if you do spot one consider yourself lucky!

Frustrating Measures

Shopping can be a nightmare when it comes to weights and measures. At the market you

will see kilogram packets of flour and sugar, pints of milk, litres of orange juice and lbs of loose apples, or in kilograms if pre-packed. Oddly, cold meats and cheese are sold in pounds and ounces and again in kilos and grammes when pre-packed.

Should you go to the builder's merchants more confusion awaits you, for if ordering plasterboard it will be 8 foot long by 1.2 metres wide, while hardboard sheets are 8 foot by 4 foot. Sand can be delivered by the cubic yard or tonne along with 50 kg bags of cement. Plumbing waste

pipes are one & a quarter inches or one & a half inches in metre lengths, but copper tubing is in metric sizes. In some cases too, timber is sold in metre lengths but the width is measured in inches.

And what about carpets? They are sold by the square or per running foot- in 3 or 4 metre widths.

Clocking up the miles in your car you will need petrol pumped by the litre, while a car's fuel consumption is rated in miles per gallon, and the engine's capacity in cubic centimetres.
